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PART-I

Executive Summary

The long cherished dream of the people of Bargarh came true with the emergence of a new college on the educational map of Odisha at Bargarh in 1960. The credit for the same goes to the untiring efforts of a number of enthusiastic gentlemen of Bargarh led by the then Sub-Divisional Officer, late Radhamohan Mohanty. The response of the people from every nook and corner of the Bargarh Sub-Division was overwhelming and spontaneous donations and contributions poured in all forms – cash, kind as well as land from the rich and the poor. The contributions of various Panchayats within the then Bargarh Sub-Division to the establishment of the College, and subsequently for its smooth running was especially note-worthy. Hence, the College was named Panchayat College.

Considered as the rice-bowl of Odisha, Bargarh is a fast growing industrial town with major industrial units like **Bargarh Cement Limited (ACC)**, **Sugar and Spinning Mills** and world famous **Sambalpuri Bastralaya**, with a rich cultural heritage manifested in the longest and largest mythological open-air opera in the world named **Dhanu Jatra**. The National Highway No.56 passing through Bargarh and the railway line connecting it with Raipur – Vizag main line at Titlagarh along with Howrah-Mumbai main line at Jharsuguda ensure good communication to the major cities and towns of not only Odisha but also those of India.

It is the first ever College in Odisha to have started teaching from the first year of its inception in its well-furnished building. The original building of the College was formally inaugurated by Utkal Kesari, Dr. Hare Krushna Mahatab, the then Chief Minister of Odisha, on 5th July 1960. As most of the students come from villages, hostel facilities were provided right from its inception.

Away from the din and bustle of Bargarh town, the College is situated at its Southern extreme. The College campus extends over an area of more than 50 acres. The trees surrounding the college provide a natural lap to the students joining the College with an urge to learn. The long lines of Eucalyptus trees take the pressure off teaching from students and class rooms. Thanks to Hirakud waters, the sight of lush green paddy fields

on both sides of the road leading to the College, even during the summer, is quite soothing. In short, the natural environment of the college is most congenial to serious studies.

The college was initially affiliated to the Utkal University but with the establishment of Sambalpur University from 1st January 1967 the college was affiliated to Sambalpur University.

A turning point in the history of this college was 9th March 1971, when it was taken over by the Govt. of Odisha. In its journey towards the academic peak the college scaled another height in the beginning of Post Graduate teaching in 1988. At present the college has Post Graduate teaching in Commerce, Odia, Pol. Sc. & Mathematics.

Due to liberalization, privatization and globalization, higher education in the country is facing new challenges in the form of competitions, opening of market based subjects, and inculcation of new value system. The present day higher education has to play a dual role of equipping the youths with the knowledge and skills required to cope with the job market and developing the human qualities / values which will not only help them to live a peaceful life but also in upholding the rich cultural heritage of our country.

Keeping the above goals in mind, despite many constraints as a govt. college this institute is striving hard to achieve the set requirements. The Self Study Report is a humble attempt to present our strength and weakness at this moment with a hope to overcome the weakness. The report prepared from the available records in the college is hereby submitted for re-assessment and re-accreditation to the august body of NAAC Peer Team.

The report was prepared with the collective efforts of all members of teaching and non-teaching staff under the able leadership of the Principal Sri Binod Kumar Sarangi.

1. 1. Curriculum Planning and Implementation

Vision:

Panchayat College aspires to have a transformational impact on students of various backgrounds enabling them to discover their inner potentialities through comprehensive education by inculcating qualities of human values, competence, confidence and excellence.

Mission:

- ❖ To instill scientific temper and develop skilled human resource to contemporary challenges.
- ❖ To facilitate young quest learners with opportunities to hone their ethics, multidimensional personality and leadership potential.
- ❖ To sensitize learners towards inclusive social concerns, human rights, gender and environmental issues.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The curriculum design and development action plans are prepared by the Sambalpur University (S.U.), to which the College is affiliated. For effective implementation, department-wise senior teachers of all its affiliated colleges as members of Board of

Studies are invited by S.U. in meeting/workshop of curricula development and the faculty members of the College take an effective role.

The HODs conduct their departmental meetings with faculty members at the beginning of the session and develop academic plans for the session. For effective implementation of the curriculum, the syllabus and the number of classes are divided among the faculty members at the beginning of the academic session, keeping in mind the syllabus to be tested in various unit tests. Teachers also take extra classes to complete the assigned syllabus within the stipulated time. Tutorial classes are taken for the honours courses. Remedial coaching classes (UGC sponsored) for SC, ST, OBC (Non Creamy Layer) and Minority students are also taken for pass and honours courses during the month of December onwards.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The Sambalpur University regularly organizes refresher courses, orientation programs and workshops to keep the knowledge and teaching aptitude of the teachers updated. The faculty of the college can discuss their issues or problems, if any, while participating in the meetings of the Board of Studies. The College also encourages the teachers to participate in the Orientation/ Refresher Courses/ Workshops/ Seminars organized by the affiliating university to update the knowledge and to improve the teaching practices. The college bears all the expenditures of travelling including registration/ participation fee etc. The college provides ample books and other teaching and reference material like Journals, Magazines, Teaching Models and softwares to enable its teachers to ensure effective delivery of curriculum.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other Statutory agency.

Following initiatives are taken up by the College:

- Provides latest reference books.
- Provides internet facility at different segments of the College.
- Provides modern teaching aids, like LCD projector.
- Organizes computer skill development programme for the faculty so that they are able to use modern teaching aids in classroom instructions.
- Encourages the teachers to participate in special lectures organized by the College/other Colleges/affiliating University.
- Practical oriented departments conduct educational tour.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

Industry:

The HR managers of various companies like ACC Cement, Sugar Mills, Pepsi beverage Pvt. Ltd. located in the district are invited to the college campus to interact with the students. The students of various departments of the college are taken for industrial visits from time to time to keep them abreast of the latest developments in the market.

Research Bodies:

To keep the research temper alive in the campus, research Scholars from various fields are invited to the college to motivate the students to take up research projects in their further studies. The faculty members of the college are also motivated to take up research projects initiated by the affiliating university or the UGC. Faculty members on their own also keep on interacting with various research bodies and participate in various research projects.

University:

The faculty members of the college keep regularly in touch with their counter parts at the affiliating university and get latest information regarding their own respective subjects. They keep on visiting the Parent University time to time to keep themselves abreast of the latest trends in their field of study. Further, Professors from the parent university campus are also invited to the college from time to time to deliver seminars and talks to the faculty members.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.)

Though the college faces a few constraints to modify the syllabus on its own, yet the affiliating university has a system in place to get recommendations from its affiliated colleges through Board of Studies. Large number of faculty presently nine (09) members from nine different department of the college represents the academic bodies of the Sambalpur University, Sambalpur who regularly participate in the process of syllabus design. Our teachers also participate in the discussions relating to the curriculum design. Whenever they find that the syllabus needs to be modified to meet the present trends, they communicate their ideas in black and white to their respective Members of board of Studies through the Principal of the college.

The members of the faculty brain storm and discuss amongst themselves the relevance of the syllabus designed by the affiliating university. While recommending or forwarding the suggestions to the Board of Studies our teachers normally take into consideration the students' feedback as well as other faculty members of various departments. It has been a regular practice of the college to depute senior most faculty to meet the students in the class rooms exclusively and informally outside the class room to get their informal feedback. Outcome of parent-teacher meetings as well as report from the administration is also taken into consideration while forwarding suggestions to the board of studies.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? We accept that the radius of our autonomy is limited. The college does not enjoy the freedom to frame its own curriculum for any of the academic programs. However, the college tries to supplement the syllabus by arranging special classes for students or by inviting experts from various fields.

1.1.8. How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

- Discussion among the faculty members of the Department from time to time for the successful implementation of the curriculum.
- Assignments, projects and unit tests are taken in the class to understand how the students are coping with the syllabus. Systematic documentation is maintained to review the outcomes of the curriculum. If at any step, the college realizes that the laid objectives are not being achieved, the college plans for a remedial action and strategies are devised to bridge the gaps, if any, in the delivery of the curriculum to ensure that it enables the college to achieve the stated objectives of the curriculum.
- Opinions expressed by external examiners at the time of final practical examinations towards improvement are considered.
- Provides infrastructure for teaching-learning.

1.2. Academic Flexibility:

1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning /dual degree? If ‘yes’, give details.

College at its own level does not offer dual degree programmes. But number of college students are pursuing certificate course in vocational programmes from IGNOU. The college supports such students in terms of guidance from expert teachers.

1.2.3 Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability. Issues may cover the following and beyond:

a) Range of Core / Elective options offered by the University and those opted by the college

The core options are compulsory and are combined with elective options. Students reading three years degree course in Arts leading to Bachelors Degree shall have to choose two elective subjects, one for first two years and the other for the final year. There are five elective subjects offered in the college Viz.-Indian Polity, Indian Economy, Landmarks in Indian History, Education, Psychology, Logic & Communicative English. Each student has to select two electives which they have not opted as main subjects either as pass or Hons. The Final year Economics Hons. students have also flexibility of selecting two papers viz., any one from International Economics, History of Economic Thought and Mathematical Economics and one from public economics, Economics of Social Sectors & Environment issues and Business Economics. Students reading for three years Degree course in Science leading to Bachelor Degree shall have to choose a Minor Elective during 1st year and a Major Elective during 2nd year. For Biology students minor elective is math and for Physical Science students Biology is the Minor elective. Physics, Chemistry & Mathematics are offered as major electives only.

b) Choice based credit system. (C.B.C.S.): The College follows the annual system.

- **Skill Development Course.**

The college has so far not offered any skill development course.

- **Credit transfer system and accumulation facility:**

No credit transfer and accumulative facility exists.

- **Courses offered in modular form:**

Courses are provided unit wise and are arranged in the modular form at department level by academic committees comprising of HOD's, staff and Principal. The modules so arranged are also used for testing the students in the exams, (1st Terminal, 2nd Terminal and Special tests).

- **Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes & courses.**

No lateral mobility within and across the programmes exists, however, vertical mobility exists. A student may have to take fresh admission from 1st year if he/she wants to change discipline.

- **Enrichment courses**

The existing courses are enriched by preparing the students to design small projects and presentations related to theory work. Language Lab facility is under construction by the Centre for Advanced Communication, IIT, Kharagpur to develop the communication skills among the students. To add, lectures by the experts are also organized from time to time to update the knowledge of our students.

1.3. Curriculum Enrichment:

- 1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University’s Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution’s goals and objectives are integrated?**

The institution being an affiliated college of Sambalpur University does not have the freedom of formulating its own curriculum. Still, the courses run at UG and PG levels have their relevance to the institution’s goals and objectives. The college aims to impart such knowledge as may be necessary for the all-round development of the character of students thereby making them capable of being better employed and at par with the highly competitive job markets.

- To reach out to the goals and objectives, the institution has evolved additional inputs in the syllabi to face the current trends in competitive areas. A series of Focused Group Discussions among faculty members at departmental level throw light on the limitations in the syllabus.
- To make up any deficiencies, the college supplements the university’s Curriculum by imparting special courses like Personality Development, Guidance for various Competitive exams like AIEEE, IIT, PMET, Bank PO etc.
- The college has also started UGC Sponsored Remedial classes for the empowerment of SC/BC and other backward casts. The college ensures that the University Curriculum is followed in the best of the spirit.
- The college academic calendar is prepared every session with the active involvement of the heads of various departments and the college advisory committee. The Principal makes sure that the curriculum framed by the university is supplemented in such a way that it reflects “the Mission and the Vision” of the college.
- At UG level, the college following the University instructions offers a compulsory paper in the name of ‘Environmental Education’. This paper has been designed and developed by the eminent academicians. The syllabus of this paper is framed in such a way by the university that ecology and environment protection and preservation, value orientation, global and national demands have made their entry significantly in the course of studies.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

As discussed in point 1.3.1, the college strictly adheres to the syllabus designed by Sambalpur University but while delivering this syllabus content to the students, our faculty enrich it with their own expertise and experience so that the students also gain employable qualities that enable them to get jobs in this highly competitive world.

- Syllabus revised recently as to enable the students to compete in the global employment market facing All India level examinations like Indian Economic service/ NET/ GATE/ Banking/ UPSC etc.
- The institution is completely computerized at the administration and academic levels. Computer labs are well equipped with latest computers. Internet facility is made available at the library. OHP, Computers, LCD Projectors have been used for effective communication and teaching.
- The affiliating University is almost ready for the introduction of semester pattern with choice based credit system in all UG programmes from the coming academic session 2015-16.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The cross cutting issues like Gender, Climate Change, Environment Education, Human Rights, ICT etc, find an ample space when it comes to applying them positively into the curriculum.

- The college, at its own level makes arrangements for seminars at local level where in the experts from above mentioned fields are invited to share and deliver their experiences and knowledge.
- The college organizes state level seminars on women empowerment, female foeticide.
- The college organizes self-defence training for girls.
- College has been celebrating 'Van Mahotsava' with the support of the staff and the local forest department. The Faculties of the Department of Botany has established an Ex-situ conservation of medicinal plants at the verge of extinction in Gandhamardan Hills in its Botanical Garden.
- Our faculty members deliver lecture and present paper on the relevance of Human Rights and Public Interest Litigation etc.
- The subject of environment education is a part of the college curriculum. It is compulsory for all the students, irrespective of any stream, to clear the paper of environment.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/programmes offered to ensure holistic development of the students?

- **Moral and ethical values:** Through the active participation in NSS and NCC activities. Yoga classes are organized regularly for the development of moral values in the students. Sports, blood donation camp and plantation programme are organized by NSS to develop leadership quality and social ethical values in the students.
- **Employable and life skills:** Being a government general degree college, the College cannot ensure employability directly. The NCC unit organizes different vocational trainings particularly in military and paramilitary subjects. Some cadets also attend

SSB & IMA Coaching in Army attachment programmes of NCC. Career counseling classes are organized for employability.

- **Better career options:** There is no formal system in the College.
- **Community orientation:** The College has NSS unit, Red Ribbon Club, Legal Literacy Club, NCC female wing, NCC male wing and Science Forum to organize and to encourage the students to participate in community services/oriented programmes. These units regularly organize/participate in different social activities to impart students' community orientation and to develop sensitivity towards social challenges of the society.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The college organizes meeting of the students and parents and takes their suggestions and tries its best through the member of board of studies to incorporate them in the curriculum.

An advisory committee of five experienced faculty members has been constituted to monitor and evaluate the efficiency and success of these enrichment programs. This committee meets with the higher authorities like Principal and the Governing bodies from time to time and amends the enrichment programs to meet the desired objectives. The Institution makes sure that the programmes offered in the curriculum include contribution to national development, fostering global competencies among students, inculcating a value system among students, promoting the use of technology and quest for excellence. The College's efforts to ensure that the curriculum bears a thrust on these core values include the initiative for Contribution to national development. The college uses education as the tool for empowering women and through the transaction of the curriculum it has adopted, it seeks to address the all-round development of the students enrolled in the various academic programs it offers.

The college has faculty who are members of Board of Studies of the University who develop curriculum of respective subjects.

The plan is sent to the Department of Higher Education (DHE), Government of Odisha for approval. After reviewing by the academic and administrative peers of the DHE, a team of the Sambalpur University visits the college to inspect the infrastructure and then put their recommendation

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

Admission into all classes is done through e-Admission process of the Govt. of Odisha. It is widely circulated through the website: www.dheorissa.in. Admission notification is published in leading national and regional daily newspapers. The notification contains detailed information about number and range of courses, eligibility, process of admission and academic as well as support facilities. Prospectus giving all the academic, administrative and financial aspects related to admission process is made available to students. The same information is also available on the college website: www.panchayatcollege.in

Transparency:

The college follows academic calendar, provided by the Department of Higher Education, Odisha, of events giving last date for receipt of application through Students Admission Management System officials. The merit list is prepared and its notification is displayed on the notice board and also in the Website. The selected candidates' lists are displayed on the notice boards. The selection is done through admission committees of the SAMS. Thus, transparency is ensured from the stage of notification till the completion of admission process. Hence access, equity and social justice are ensured through transparency and adherence to rules

Admission into Degree classes is done as per the criteria laid by Govt. of Odisha through e-admission. Selection of students to the course is based on marks obtained in qualifying exam. The college admits the students solely on the basis of merit in the qualifying examination. Admission into P.G. classes is done on the basis of aggregate marks in the qualifying examinations. The students having honours at degree level are given first preference in respective subjects.

2.2 Catering To Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to govt. policies in this regard?

The institution is fully adhering to governmental policies regarding the needs of differently-abled students. Seats are reserved at the time of admission in various programmes. The college ensures this sure that the classes of such students are held at ground floor only for the purpose of easy accessibility of rooms to them. During examinations such students are provided with help such as writers for the students having vision and functional disability. These students are encouraged at every level in the institution. Special Counseling sessions and lectures are also arranged for such category of students. Such students are also given half an hour extra time in the terminal and final examination

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

No, however, before commencement of the session, admitted students are given special orientation classes to enable them to cope up with the syllabus of the course chosen by them. The Institution is well aware of the needs of the students. Any class contains a mix of intelligent and average students. We admit students of all calibers in line with our objective EDUCATION FOR ALL. In order to satisfy their queries the college ensures that there are teachers available to answer their doubts.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The college organizes remedial coaching classes for those students who belong to socio-economically weaker sections. For others proctorial classes are organized once a week for each class, where the students clarify their doubts. The institution conducts remedial classes for SC/ST/BC students in different subjects to enhance their skills and competence. Enrichment courses like personality development programmes are also conducted to improve students' personality and motivate them for an innovative and creative mindset. Where ever a disadvantageous learner is identified by the class teacher, the institute appoints a guardian teacher to help him/her with counseling and intensive coaching

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The institution holds the tradition of imparting holistic education with emphasis on the ethical and moral principles. The college which is a coeducational institution sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender inclusion, environment etc by holding seminars on the relevant topics like women empowerment. Celebration of women's day by teachers and students is also a part of the same tradition. The college, at its own level and with the assistance from UGC and other bodies like ICSSR etc. make arrangements for seminars and conferences of national level where in the experts from above mentioned fields are invited to share and deliver their experiences and knowledge. The college regularly organizes state level seminars on women empowerment, female foeticide. The Management too has supported the cause of the women education thereby offering free books to the girl students. Drawing and essay competitions are held regarding environment issues to enliven the students. Apart from this the college, as sated earlier, offers the subject to environmental education as a compulsory subject.

2.2.5 How does the institute identify and respond to special education needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners are detected by the teachers during their lectures in class room by means of getting feedback from the students orally and sometimes in writing. Students are subjected to various methods of evaluations like signaled answers, vocal responses, sample individual responses and written tests after each unit of syllabus. Based on their performances, students are identified as slow and advanced learners. They are supported in the best possible manner. The teachers take extra pain in helping them with an additional and personal interest. They are provided with the additional time, advanced learning materials and assistance from the teachers. Further such learners are motivated for higher seats of learning and top most career options. A number of motivational lectures are organized to channelize their potential to accomplish better success.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

Academic performances of the student's from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. are detected by the teachers during their lectures in classroom. We use marks as index for identifying slow learners. Students are subjected to various methods of evaluation, vocal responses, sample individual responses & written test after each unit of syllabus. Those students who do not seem to cope up with the pace of learning are advised and counseled by the teachers. They are specially advised and counseled so as to help them improve themselves. Based on their performances, students are identified as slow and advanced learners. The morale of the slow learners is boosted by counseling sessions, remedial classes and intensive interactive sessions. They are also given advice after class hours and are motivated by providing additional learning material such as text books and solved question papers from exams. The advanced learner's are given assignments and encouraged to take part in active items such as quizzes, essay writing, lecture competitions and seminars. They are encouraged to acquire new and advanced information through the internet to bring out their full potential. The creative abilities of students are given vent through wall magazines, newsletter and college magazine. All the students are exposed to peer group learning where both the slow and advanced learners are combined. A friendly environment is created to improve the communication skills of the advanced learners. A number of motivational lectures are organized to channelize their potential to achieve success.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning & evaluation schedules (Academic Calendar, Teaching plan, evaluation blue-print etc.)?

The college has an academic calendar developed by the Government of Odisha. Each teacher has to prepare teaching plan for the course allotted to him/her and he/she maintains the daily progress of the plan. So far as evaluation of students' progress is concerned, the annual evaluation schedule is prepared by the University. For periodical evaluation, the college organizes three unit tests in a session in each subject.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC provides the development and application of quality benchmarks/parameters for the various academic and administrative activities of the institution. It also imparts knowledge through team work at relentless efforts. It promotes the research and consultancy and develops state of art infrastructure. It promotes synergetic relationship with the industry and society to appoint well-endowed faculty and to upgrade their acumen. It also ensures timely, efficient and progressive performance of academic, administrative and financial tasks.

This cell monitors promotion, implementation and continuous improvement of innovations in Curriculum, Co-curricular and Extra-curricular activities of the institution. The IQAC works towards the enhancement of the learner's knowledge, capacity and personality.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The college offers a lot of support services to its teachers for making the learning student centric. The college provides a well stocked library with Reading Room facility of latest books and journals which the faculty uses efficiently & frequently to provide comprehensive and latest information to the students. Students are also encouraged to use the library independently that enhances their knowledge. Apart from it, the college provides a state of the art seminar hall, model smart class room and Interactive Teaching Board Facility. Students are motivated to participate in GD's, Debates and Seminars. The college also encourages the use of internet and computers by the staff and students to keep them abreast of the latest developments in their respective field of study for which the college is having Wi-Fi campus facility.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

To encourage the artistic temper among the students, the college teachers motivate them to participate in various extra mural activities in youth festivals. The long list of prizes won by our students in youth festivals and other district and state level competitions bears a testimony to it. At the same time, to encourage the scientific temper among students, the faculty engages the students in various practical works on science labs and computer labs.

To sharpen the critical thinking among students, various GDs, debates and seminars are organized in which students explore new ideas and also get a chance to listen to the expert views of eminent professionals.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The use of modern multi-media teaching aids like OHP, multimedia projectors, Internet enabled computer systems, Interactive classroom teaching Board are usually employed in class room instructions as well as other student learning experiences. Since the college has high speed Wi-Fi campus facility, Access to e-learning resources from **Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information** become much easier. Most of the departments particularly in the faculty of Science are equipped with modern teaching aids like computer OHP, LCD, charts, models, maps etc. These aids are also used by the departments in the Arts and Commerce faculty during seminars as and when required.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

College conducts lectures and seminars by experts on various issues in which faculty members and students are encouraged to participate and reap benefits. The teachers go for refresher and orientation courses. Educational tours are also conducted. Over the past many years the faculty has been participating in the conferences and presenting papers in national and international level seminars.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling / mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

Yes, the college has a proctorial system in all departments. The proctors act as advisors for each class/group of students. The proctors maintain data sheets where every meeting with the students is recorded.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college encourages the teachers to keep themselves abreast of the latest developments in their respective fields. They are encouraged to use computers, Internet and library resources to enrich their teaching. The college faculty is also provided training for use of computers, latest software so that they can themselves create modern teaching aids to be used in their classrooms. From time to time the college faculty adopts approaches/methods such as seminars, conferences and special lectures. The faculty members are encouraged to participate in National/International level seminars. They are provided financial assistance for this purpose. The faculty members who attend such seminars/ conferences share their experience with students and faculty with latest information.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The institution has centralized library. The library continues to provide the following current awareness services in order to alert users to latest information of their interest.

- List of new entries
- Useful articles
- News items

The catalogues from different publishers are filed. Heads of departments can order for books from these catalogues. The range of subjects represented by the library collection reflects our institution's ever growing zest for newer areas of study and research. Some faculty members have their personal collection of a large number of books and they share the books and journals with the fellow colleagues, the PG and UG students round the clock. Majority of staff can efficiently use the internet and they liberally share their knowledge of innovative research topics, reviews, methodology, data gathering and information output with the learners. Students are also encouraged to make use of library services. They are provided with a student library card which enables them to get books issued from the library. Students are also taken to the library to instill reading habits among them.

2.3.10 Does this institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, due to acute shortage of staff, the present strength of staff is overburdened with curricular and co-curricular activities. Each teacher is assigned some extra classes to complete the courses in time. Besides, some guest-faculties are also appointed to help the existing faculties.

IQAC through interaction with teachers and students submit reports of the feedback to the Principal. The institute through house examinations, feedback from students and teachers and ACR report monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning. Each departmental head is entrusted to monitor the quality of teaching of the faculty members of the Department. The Principal also visits frequently to the department to discuss with the faculty at times to inspect the classes.

The institution extends full support for the professional development of the faculty. The faculties are encouraged to pursue their M. Phil. and Ph. D. through faculty development schemes. The institution deputed its teachers to attend refresher and orientation programs, conferences, seminars and training programs organized by other institutes, universities and research organizations. The institution also conducts number of seminars, workshops and special lectures for the benefit of its faculties and students. The institute has conducted few seminars during last three years. The Institute grants duty leaves according to the nature of work.

Yes, our institute has recently introduced the evaluation of the teachers by students and external peers. The head of the institution takes feedback of the teachers from the students and their guardians. At the end of every academic year students give feedback of individual faculty members on their teaching skills on a prescribed format. The feedback from mainly focuses on the various teaching skills of the faculty members, like presentation, communication, knowledge, content covered, innovative practices and laboratory work. If any faculty doesn't meet the benchmark on feedback, he/she is counseled for the future.

2.5 Evaluation process and Reforms:

- 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stake holders of the institution especially students and faculties are aware of the evaluation process?**

The Stakeholders of the institution i.e. students and faculty members and even the parents of the students are informed about evaluation process by giving general instructions mentioned in the prospectus of the institution. The periodic instructions issued by the parent university are promptly communicated to the students. The faculty members read the instructions even in the classrooms and copy of the same is also displayed on the students' notice-board. Likewise they are informed at the start of the session regarding the terminal tests after the gap of three months. Students are clearly made aware of the eligibility conditions required to appear in the final exams. They are informed of the criterion of the internal assessment. The evaluation is the integral part of teaching learning process. So, the institution makes effective arrangements for the smooth application of the rules about the evaluation processes. The college has developed a proper mechanism for this purpose. Time to time staff meetings are also conducted concerning evaluation process.

Recently no evaluation reforms have been introduced by the affiliating university. However, the college has introduced Unit Test System of its own as a part of formative evaluation of the students' academic progress. The existing evaluation rules laid by the affiliating University for summative evaluation are strictly adhered by the authorities of the college.

As a measure of formative assessment the College conducts three Unit Tests and the students are given feedback on their performance. The summative evaluation is done by the University every year during the months of March to May.

Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The institution evaluates the students through three unit tests within a period of three months. The report is sent to the head of institution after evaluating in a fair and secret manner. The parents are informed through letters and even telephonically (for weak students). To monitor the students' performance during an academic year, an examination / evaluation board is constituted in the college. This board works under the directions of the Chair. The record of the whole evaluation process is transparent. The answer books are shown to the students. A special test is also conducted in the month of February for students, who have not cleared the conditions for final examination. The board arranges to inform the parents the results of unit tests and the attendance of the students.

2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

There is no internal assessment system in the College.

2.5.7 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The graduate attributes are specified in the University Syllabi differently for different subjects.

2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college & the University level?

Students having grievances with the evaluation process or his every doubt is made clear by showing his performance in the answer sheet. The student is made clear about every grievance in his mind at the University level. For this process, some re-evaluation fee is charged from the student and evaluation process is again repeated. The examination are conducted and controlled by university. The college has to follow the instructions of the university. If students have any problem, the principal of the college communicate to the concerning authority (Controller of Exams or other offices) of university about the grievances of the students. The institute follows open evaluation system where the student performance is displayed on the notice board and the same is communicated to the parents. All grievances regarding evaluation, including the unit assessment marks awarded to the students, are redressed by the Examination Board and the various Heads of Departments. There is a provision for re-evaluation and is permitted on request. The Controller coordinates with the other members of the Examination board and assists students in the redressal of their problems regarding conduction of examination, evaluation process & results.

2.6 Student performance and learning outcomes

The learning outcomes are stated by the University for each Course. The courses of studies are supplied to the students and teachers to make them aware of the learning outcomes.

The faculty members also show the evaluated copy of the Unit test in the classroom and provide necessary feedback to the student about their progress. The academic progress of the learners is closely monitored by the teachers and discussed in the meeting of the Department as well as meeting of the Heads of the Department. The college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) which meets periodically and discuss various issues relating to teaching & learning.

- Every year at least any one department may take initiative to organize state/national level seminars/workshops.
- The faculty members may involve more in minor/major research projects.
- The faculty members may increase their participation in national/ international level research oriented programmes, like refresher/training programme on research methodology, statistical packages etc., conferences, seminars and workshops.

Impact:

- One national level seminars was organized by Department of Odia on the occasion of Gangadhar Meher Jayanti on “Sahe barsare Tapaswini”
- Three faculty member i.e, two from Department of English and One from Department of History has obtained UGC funded minor projects.
- Three faculty members are continuing their Doctoral research.
- Many faculty members presented research papers in state/national/ international seminars/conferences.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects?

- **Autonomy to the principal investigator:** Faculty members are engaged with doctoral and other minor & major research projects. The principal investigator has full freedom in deciding the research area, research methodology, choice of books and instruments/equipments etc. for conducting the research projects.
- **Timely availability or release of resources:** The college authority always tries to pursue the release of the funds to the principal investigator as per the norms of the funding agency

- **Adequate infrastructure and human resources:** Though the College does not have outstanding infrastructure facilities for research, but it has preliminary infrastructure facility in science departments regarding instruments. Moreover, the College is planning to establish an integrated research laboratory where advanced equipments of various science departments will be installed. The College provides ICT enabled facility in different segments through computers with internet. Besides, the faculty members who have research projects also purchase laboratory instruments and books from the project fund according to the need.
- **Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers:** The Department of Higher Education, Government of Odisha gives permission to the principal investigator to carry out research schemes/projects without hampering his/her normal duties in the College. (b) The faculty members going for research paper presentation in state/national/international level seminar/conference/ workshop are supported with duty leave.
- **Support in terms of technology and information needs:** The College supports its faculties in terms of technology and information needs through computer with internet facilities in different segments of the College.
- **Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities:** The College conducts financial audit in all cases of MRP and received/sanctioned fund for organizing national seminars by a private C.A. The Principal and D.D.O. of the College helps the faculty in timely auditing and submitting the utilization certificate to the funding agencies.

3.1.4. What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture among the students?

- To develop scientific temper and aptitude, the institution organizes University tours of final year students of all departments to interact with the research scholars of the university campus.
- Various departments of the college also organize State level seminars to create curiosity among the students as well as to get a chance to meet with the distinguished persons of the related area.
- Local resource person working in various field like medical, forestry, agriculture, history and social fields are invited to various departments to deliver seminar talks on related areas which motivate the students for research.
- In some of the Department like Education, each student has to complete a small project work based on socio-educational surveys. The purpose is to develop the scientific temper & research culture among the students. Some other departments in science faculty also take special care while conducting the experiments to develop the creative attitude of the students.

The institute has been conducting basic degree programs and in these degree programs there is no provision for research work. However, for the inculcation of research aptitude in the students, institute takes several initiatives like interdisciplinary seminars on the current, relative and burning issues in Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Environment Science. Faculty of Arts/Commerce also takes several initiatives in these directions. Since Environment Science and Computer Science are the top priorities of the global science, more emphasis is given on interaction amongst the students so as to generate a common thinking from every angle, for interdisciplinary research. The Course of Environment Science designed by the university is taken up by all the students up to degree level and its altogether impact on the society draws more attention on these issues of research.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

Library facilities and its conducive environment encourage/ motivate the staff and students to take a forward step to pursue research in their relevant field/interests. The Institute has a well-stocked library which includes latest syllabi as well as reference books of all relevant subjects and disciplines and the institute is always eager to purchase new edition of books every year. Only last year college purchased new books worth rupees two lacs. Basic research facilities are available in all Science departments. Each department has relevant infrastructure and instruments for basic research work. Internet connectivity has also been provided in many departments to help them review their academic as well as research programs. Institute also ensures that the deserving students should be facilitated to use the equipments, books, Journal, and museum facility of Botany as well as Zoology Department beyond the college timing and also during winter/summer vacations.

Ours is an institution that is more than 50 years old. Taking into consideration the age of the college, some of the instruments have become obsolete. To update and to purchase the latest technology, the college applied for equipment grants to the UGC during the 11th plan. Recently, the UGC has sanctioned Rs. 20 lakhs from State Govt. to purchase the equipments especially for the science department. These gadgets and equipments can be utilized by the researchers.

3.3. Research Facilities

3.3.1 What are research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

As mentioned earlier, we are an under graduate and post graduate college and curriculum of the courses available in the college does not carry any research component, hence no research scholar is enrolled. But in spite of this, the basic research facilities are available for the faculty. Dr. Iswar Baitharu, Department of Zoology is working on the anti-cancer drug development in ovarian cancer cell model. He has conjugated folate with a known anti-cancerous drug Noscapine and synthesized folate-Noscapine. Since ovarian cancerous cell overexpress folate receptor, this conjugated drug will have targeted drug delivery to ovarian cancer cell only resulting in effective disease treatment with minimal side effects.
- **Research studies or surveys benefiting the community or improving the services**
Dr. S.K Sen, Department of Botany has completed his doctoral work on documentation of ethno-medicinal plants in the Gandhamardan hills located in the Bargarh District. The Gandhamardan hills have been mentioned in the epic "THE RAMAYANA" for its rich diversity of medicinal plant variety like "SANJIBANI". His works bear great importance and has direct implication in the society for the fact

that this biodiversity hotspot, a part of Eastern Ghat Hill range is in the verge of extinction. Department of Botany is also trying to preserve some of the medicinal plants found in Gandhamardan Hills in its Botanical Garden through Ex-Situ conservation.

Mr. B.C Sahu, Department of Physics, has published a paper on Nuclear Physics in the journal “Physical Reviews C” on 5th Sept. 2013 which has been widely cited and appreciated in the research community.

The College has 100 volunteers of NSS unit with a faculty member as the Programme Officer. Under YRC unit there is a Red Ribbon Club which is funded by State AIDS Control Society, sister concern of the NACO. Under the NSS unit there is also a Legal Literacy Club under the guidance of District Legal Service Authority.

NSS organizes/participates/observes different activities/programmes as part of regular activities and special camp activities and also participates in many programmes organized by different schools units and sub-divisional unit. Red Ribbon Club works for awareness building among the students and community people about HIV/AIDS. The club participates/ organizes quiz contest, poster gallery presentation, rally, awareness generating seminar/symposium on HIV/AIDS. LLC organizes awareness generating programmes on legal aspects. NCC cadets participate in various special camps where basic military training in small arms and parades are given to develop capacity among students to meet emergencies and natural disasters. Their regular activity is to practice parades and they also participate in state/national level parades on Independence Day, Republic Day aiming to develop a sense of national integration among students.

Besides, people from the neighboring community, students from different schools and different NSS units are invited to the college in different programmes which promotes neighborhood-community network. Public representatives are always invited in different programmes to make a strong attachment with the college. Moreover, the NSS, YRC and NCC units of the college are committed to stand with the community at times of harsh conditions such as natural calamity, flood etc.

- The college organizes Debates, Dramas, and Rallies etc. on various social issues like National Unity, AIDS Awareness, Women Empowerment, Environment, Blood donation camp by YRC etc. Members of staff of the college are in-charge of such activities and student participation is encouraged.

The management has developed evaluation tools for stakeholders to record their opinion, suggestions and objection for constructive developments for future. 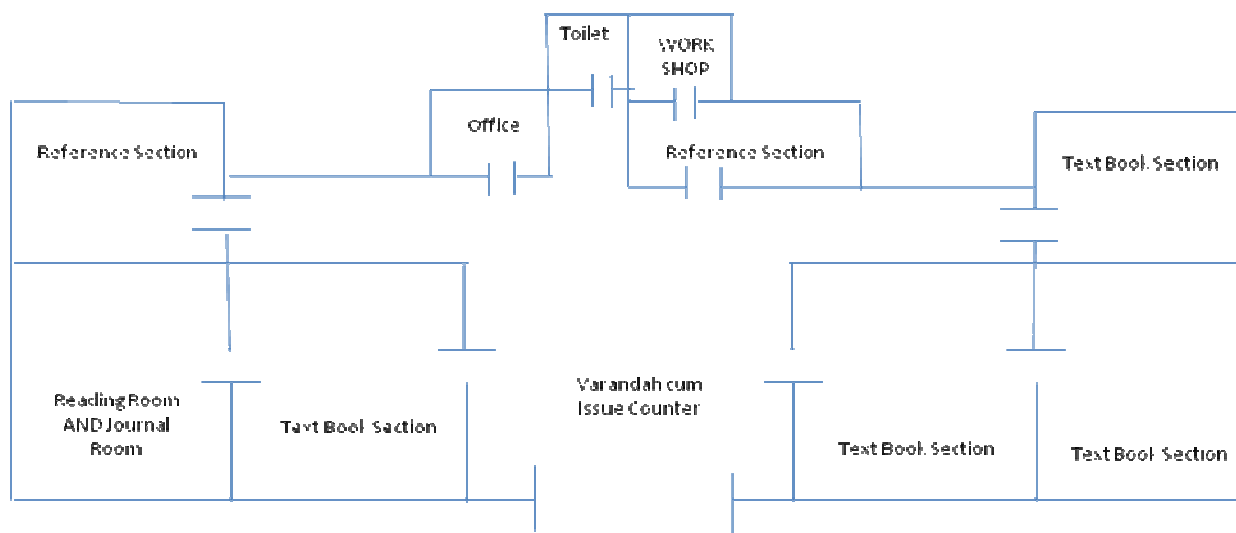

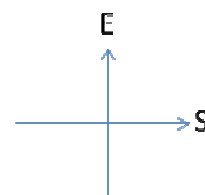

The counseling cell makes adequate arrangement for the guidance of the students during the time of the admissions. The students seeking admission are counseled in the choice making matters during the admission. The choice of the career and the doubts of the students are listened to very carefully and the solutions of the problems are provided. The students who need psychological counseling or any type of social counseling are also attended to very carefully. The following services are made available for the students:

Academic & Career Counseling:

The students, at the time of the admission, are helped by the faculty present in choosing right stream. They are informed about the scope and nature of the various subjects that form the syllabus. The students are not pressurized in choosing the subjects. They are given right kind of counseling which helps them shape their career.

Personal & Psycho-Social Counseling:

The students during the course of their studies in the college come across various issues. They are, at times, too immature to handle the problems. The college provides them personal counseling. They can share their problems with the teachers. The teacher concerned are very supportive in guiding them fight their problems. The candidates at times come face to face with certain social issues or problems which tend to develop inferiority complex in them. The teachers make it sure that no such deterioration happens with the psycho social understanding of the students. They are counseled to become better human beings and advised to stand tall for the social cause.

- The college also arranges cost free remedial classes for the weak students.

- Feedback from its stakeholders on its institutional performance and provisions are collected by the Principal and Committees in various meetings.
- Graduates data seek from the Alumni association profile.
- The obtained data are discussed and measures taken to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions.

The college seeks data and feedback from its graduates and employers on personal contact basis. The data is used after having a discussion among members of the staff for improvement/implementation.

5.3.4 How does the College involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.

The Teachers' Council of the College has a magazine subcommittee. Besides, the Students' Council has three members as editor and sub-editor of the college magazine. They jointly take decisions regarding the publication of the college magazine which provides opportunity to students in decision-making. The annual College Magazine "Jyoti Prajna" is published in each academic session. Students are encouraged to contribute. It provides ample scope to the students to explore their skills. Many departments publish hand-written wall magazine.

The college publishes its Magazines annually to which the students contribute articles. Besides they are also encouraged to contribute to periodicals published from outside.

5.3.5 Does the College have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

Yes, the college has a students' Union, which is constituted by an elected body of office bearers and guided by an Adviser and Associate Advisers from among the members of the staff.

Selection & Constitution:

The Council is elected through election for an academic session. The office bearers of the Council are elected by the voting of general candidates. The class representatives are elected by the voting of particular class. The Council consists of 18 members as Office bearers – President, Vice president, General Secretary & Joint Secretary, Secretary & Joint Secretary Social Entertainment, Secretary & Assistant Secretary Games and Sports, Secretary & Assistant Secretary Common Room (for Men), Secretary & Assistant Secretary Common Room (for Women), Secretary & Assistant Secretary Literary Activities Debates, Secretary & Assistant Secretary Drama, Editor & Sub-Editor (Men & Women) College Magazine.

Activities:

The Students' Union Council consists of both boys and girls students from all streams of the college to represent the whole students' body. The members as class representatives help the administration in smooth running of the college. The union members take active participation in various activities of the college like Drama/Debate, Games, Sports, etc. They are also active members of different committees like Magazine Committee, Sports Committee, IQAC, etc. In different meetings of these committees SUC members are called for suggestions. They jointly prepare the activity plan. They also take efforts to involve maximum students in the above mentioned activities organized in/ participated by the college it is the main student body that plays a supportive role to the college administration in conducting various co-curricular activities. It organizes various compositions among students and organizes functions such as Inaugural Function & Annual Function.

Funding:

The funding of the Union is constituted by a fixed amount collected from each bonafide student, who is a member of the Union.

5.3.6 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

There are no officially recognized academic and administrative bodies which have student representatives. However, there are student representatives in various committees like Magazine Committee, Cultural Committee, Sports Committee, IQAC etc. It helps to foster leadership qualities among students.

5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the Institution.

Any other relevant information regarding Student Support and Progression which the college would like to include.

The faculty members of the College maintain a good relation with the former faculty members. The institute networks with them through the activities of the College like foundation ceremony of the College etc. The former faculty members are also invited as resource person in the technical session of the seminar organized by the College. Many of them also participate and present research papers in the seminars organized by the college. The College networks with the Alumni through the activities of the Alumni Association. Former faculty members residing in the city are invited in the various activities especially in large gathering functions of the College.

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

The vision of Panchayat College is to provide inclusive education for inculcating human values, professionalism and scientific instillation to all sections of students including scheduled tribes, scheduled castes, other backward communities and religious minorities & girl students.

Mission:

- To provide ample scope for multifaceted development of local youths irrespective of caste, creed, religious affiliation or gender.
- To provide quality higher education to its students.
- To provide and promote inclusive education for all.
- To develop academic programmes based on local/regional/national/ global needs.
- To pursue student-centric learning for self-development and skill development among students.
- To nurture social awareness and responsibilities among its students.

The college aims at instilling scientific temper and developing skilled human resource to meet contemporary challenges. The college visualizes at facilitating young adult learners with opportunities to kindle their ethics and leadership potential thereby sensitizing learners towards inclusive social concerns, human rights, gender and environmental issues. The institution follows a three-fold system with academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular programs. The academic design is based on enhancing and empowering the knowledge base of the students. The focus is on the recent trends in scientific and cognitive fields. The institution's vital motto is to strengthen the inner potential and emotional quotient of the student folk.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality, policy and plans?

The annual budget allocation, teaching staff recruitment, non-teaching staff recruitment, infrastructure development, student support and welfare schemes are managed by the Department of Higher Education (DHE), Government of Odisha. The DHE, the Principal, the non-teaching staff, the Teachers' Council, Departmental Heads uphold a healthy interaction which helps in designing and implementation of its quality policy and plans. Being a Government College, the Principal has a central role for all correspondence with the management. The Principal is the administrative Head and Drawing and Disbursing Officer of the institution. The Principal in consultation with the Teachers' Council takes decisions in all academic matters. The Academic Bursar coordinates the execution of all the academic activities. Heads of various Departments synchronize regular administration of the Departments. Specific committees like Planning Committee, Purchase Committee, Examination Committee, Building Committee etc. are formed to discuss and take decisions of administrative and other activities. An elected Students' Union Council plays an important role in various institutional activities.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- i. The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission.
- ii. Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan.
- iii. Interaction with stakeholders.
- iv. Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders.
- v. Reinforcing the culture of excellence.

The Principal is the Head of the Institution. He plays the multidimensional role for smooth functioning of the College. The Management encourages formulating the Teachers' Council. To coordinate the academic activities of the College as a whole, the Teachers' Council is being formed presided by the Principal of the College and all teaching staff as members. This Council consists of the different committees with specific activities. The Council has an academic committee and a UGC committee. These two committees, HODs and the Principal jointly prepare the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission and formulate action plans time-to-time for all operations and their incorporation into the institutional strategic plan. The Principal interacts personally with all the stakeholders, faculty members, non-teaching staff, alumni, students and their parents. The committees in consultation with the Principal and student representatives act for running the day-to-day affairs of the College and are responsible for reinforcing the culture of excellence.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The Principal in coordination with Teachers' Council, different committees, HODs, Students' Union Council, Governing Bodies, NSS & NCC programme officers monitors all the institutional activities. The Principal in consultation with academic committee, UGC committee and all HODs evaluates policies and plans of the College for effective implementation and improvement from time to time.

In the beginning of the academic year, a self mapping exercise is conducted for the staff by IQAC. This exercise exposes the strengths and challenges of each of the personnel to draw a potential map, which gives insight to the management, for the distribution of responsibilities. The head of the institution appoints the conveners for various committees, and he also nominates the members of committees in consultation with the respective conveners based on the potential map. Official notice is issued along with the guidelines defining the roles and responsibilities of the committees. The committees prepare action plans and submit to the principal for approval. The committees carry out the activities and at the end of the academic year the conveners submit the reports of the work done to the head of the institution. All these activities are evaluated by the IQAC.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The academic leadership is provided to the faculty through formulation of different committees and units of the College with specific activities: (1) Academic Committee (3) Examination Committee (4) Magazine Committee (5) Library Advisory Committee (6) Seminar/Workshop/Scientific Programme Committee (7) Routine Committee (8) UGC

Committee (9) NACC Committee (10) Games and Sports Committee (11) Drama/Debate Committee (12) NCC Female Wing and Male Wing (13) NSS Wing. These committees consist of senior and young faculty members. It helps them to share and learn leadership qualities. The faculty members take care of all the activities of the mentioned committees/units.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The College Teachers' Council consists of different committees such as Building Committee, Advisory Committee, Discipline Committee, Examination Committee, etc with a combination of senior faculty members and junior faculty members. This combination of seniors and juniors helps grooming of leadership at various levels. The Students' Union Council (SUC) consists of both boys and girls students from all streams, Science, Arts, Commerce and Computer science to represent the whole student body. The members as class representatives of SUC act for running the day-to-day affairs of the College and bring it to the concerned authority. The College grooms leadership in students through NCC, NSS, YRC, Creating awareness in the students about various problems of the society. This also helps in grooming of leadership.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The College provides operational autonomy to the various departments and committees and the College administration works towards a decentralized functioning system as follows:

- Principal is the internal sanctioning authority of the finance of the College.
- The administration always seeks advice from the academic committee on different academic activities.
- The Heads of various Departments look after the day-to-day administration of the Departments and interact with the Principal.
- The various committees in consultation with the Principal make their own decisions regarding various co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities.
- Official activities are under the purview of the office superintendent.
- SUC looks after the affairs of the students and brings it to the competent authority.
- HODs give advice to the administration on departmental purchases & purchases of the College and also have a monitoring autonomy.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, the College promotes a participatory management culture in all activities.

6.2. Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, the College has a formally stated quality policy, mentioned in the vision and mission statements of the College Calendar as well as in the college website. The Principal in co-ordination with Teachers Council and IQAC develops the various activities to fulfill the quality policies time-to-time. Office superintendent of the College, librarian, student representatives from the Students' Union are involved in the quality activities making process according to needs and sometimes ex-students from the alumni are also involved

in the process. These are discussed in the Teachers' Council meetings and implemented. The Teachers' Council and IQAC monitor the execution of these activities for various departments/committees/cells and review it time to time.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

Yes, the College has a perspective plan for academic and infrastructure development. The Plan includes:

1. Academic expansion (year-wise)

- autonomous status from the UGC
- Introduction/ augmentation of programmes/courses.
- Recruitment of additional faculty and requirement of cumulative fund involvement (From DHE, Odisha)
- Additional requirement of supporting staff with cumulative fund involvement

2. Infrastructure development (year-wise)

- Construction of additional building with measurement and projected cost.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

Internal Organizational Structure:

The Principal is the administrative Head of the institution. The College has a Teachers' Council with various sub-committees (consisting of convener and members) to coordinate especially the academic matters. Some specific committees like Executive Committee of Students' Union, Anti-Ragging Committee, Committee against Sexual Harassment and Discipline Committee are the integral part of the Teachers' Council that discuss and take decisions of administrative activities. The Heads of various Departments are responsible for the day-to-day administration of the Departments and report to the Principal. The College also has an elected Students' Council which plays an important role in various institutional activities.

Decision Making Process:

It is a Government College. All external major decisions, like annual budget allocation, teaching staff and non-teaching staff recruitment, physical infrastructure development, student support and welfare scheme are managed and controlled by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Odisha in consultation with the Principal. In some cases, DHE conducts Principals' meet and discusses the issues to take decisions. Besides, the Principal meets the Director, Higher Education for specific issues of the College. The internal decision-making process is participatory. The institution uses various data and information obtained from the feedback from students, HODs and faculty, committees and cells, and the non-teaching staff in decision-making. In all important matters the Principal calls for Teachers' Council meeting and takes their views before taking final decision. The decisions are then circulated to all concerned stakeholders for execution.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following- a) Teaching & Learning b) Research & Development c) Community engagement d) Human resource management e) Industry interaction.

The quality improvement strategies of the College in teaching & learning, research & development, community engagement, human resource management, industry interaction are described broadly as under:

Strategies to improve the quality of Teaching & Learning process:

- Ensures transparency in the admission process by the publication of selected admission merit list in the College website and notice board before the date of admission.
- Gives preference on the previous academic records of students in the admission process for getting a large number of good students.
- Takes introductory classes to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice.
- Provides remedial coaching classes for the socially-backward and economically-weaker students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice.
- Follows the academic calendar.
- Provides the learning facilities like smart classrooms, modern teaching aids like LCD projector, well-equipped laboratories with lab assistants, well-stocked library with reading room and internet connection to make learning effective.
- Balancing between sanctioned and filled recruitment of teachers.
- Up gradation of the main library with new text books and reference books, internet connection.
- Faculty members are given permission with study leave to enrich their knowledge through seminars, orientation programmes, refresher courses, etc.

Strategies to improve the quality in Research & Development:

The College has a Research Committee. The committee

- Encourages teachers to submit research projects to various funding agencies; to publish quality research books, research papers in refereed journals.
- Encourages teachers to organize state/national level seminar/ workshop/ conference /symposium.
- Suggest for provision of computers with internet facility at different segments.
- Invites eminent scientists and speakers for delivering talks/ presiding the technical session of the seminar.
- Encourages students to attend the seminar, workshops, invited guest lecturers organized by the departments and other Colleges of the state.

Strategies to improve the quality in community engagement:

- The College has active NSS unit, Red Ribbon Club (RRC), NCC male and female wings. The units/cells have a planned calendar on thrust areas in which different extension activities are organized in and outside the College throughout the year to engage the students in different community oriented activities. The NSS unit also joins in various awareness campaign, rally in collaboration with different organizations like RRC, NACO, NSS sub-divisional committee etc. Many social organizations in collaboration with our NSS unit also organize discussions on awareness programmes in our college premises. The NCC wings participate in various state level and regional level parades and special camps in which basic military training in small arms and parades are given to develop capacity among students to meet emergencies and natural disasters.
- Students are also motivated to participate in various seminars and discussions to give them exposure to current societal problems and generate awareness regarding their roles and responsibilities in society.

Strategies to improve the quality in human resource management:

- Encouragement to faculty members to attend various staff development programmes.
- Provision of UGC pay scale to teachers, additional increments to M.Phil./Ph.D. awarded teachers as per UGC norms, annual increments and promotion to the faculty as per UGC norms. • Provision of Self-Appraisal Reporting system for teachers at the time of promotion from one post to another post and one grade pay to another grade pay.
- Access to computers to all sections of administration.
- Encouragement to students to attend seminar/symposium/workshop/ invited lectures.

Strategies in industry interaction:

- No such information is available.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Principal being the Head of the institution in coordination with different committees of Teachers' Council ensures that adequate information is published in the College Website and Prospectus.

The head of institution and Committee get the feedback from teachers, students and the public with regards to the teaching quality, curriculum, extracurricular activities and infrastructural demands. In the meeting of the Management Committee the information gathered from different sources are discussed with the participating members. After thorough discussion and deliberation the existing facilities and activities of the institution are reviewed and decisions are taken for their implementation after going through the available resources and modalities.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

As it is a Govt. college there is a governing body which encourages the faculty members to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The Department of Higher Education of the College encourages and supports involvement of its staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process through the formation of Teachers' Council consisting of different sub-committees with all of the teaching staff as members. The committees play the decision-making role in planning and implementation of activities in different spheres of institutional activities.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

No.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The common and individual complaints from the teaching staff are discussed and solved in the Teachers' Council monthly meeting in a healthy manner. Faculty members are also free to express their individual complaints and problems directly to the Principal privately. The complaints from the students individually or through the Students' Union Council are directly brought freely to the notice of the Principal. The complaints/grievances are attended promptly and resolved immediately. One complaint box is kept nearer to the Principal's chamber. The complaints from the other stakeholders are promptly attended by the Principal. In some cases, the Principal takes necessary action alone. In some cases, decisions are taken jointly by the Principal and concerned committee members.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

No, there has been no court cases filed by and against the institute during the last four years.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The College does not have a set mechanism of obtaining student feedback on its institutional performance. The Principal, HODs and the committees collect feedback from the students on its institutional performance in different meetings/interaction. The obtained data are analyzed and used for the improvement of its institutional performance.

6.3. Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The efforts made by the College to enhance the professional development of its staff are:

- The faculty members are encouraged to attend staff development programmes, such as orientation programmes, refresher courses, seminars, workshops, conferences, etc. They are also encouraged to organize staff development programmes.
- The teachers are encouraged and motivated to submit research projects to various funding agencies. They are also motivated to join in individual research for M.Phil./Ph.D. programme.
- The non-teaching staffs are encouraged to attend the staff development programmes such as training programme on functioning and management of library, training on use of free and open source software in libraries etc.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The strategies adopted by the College for faculty empowerment are:

- The faculty members are encouraged to attend Orientation Programme, Refresher Courses, Seminars, Workshops, Conferences, Symposium, short-term training and sanctioned duty leaves by the Principal and DHE. Detailed information regarding the programmes is also circulated.
- They are also encouraged to receive grants for research project/individual research from the funding agencies, like UGC etc. Duty leave is sanctioned to them to present research papers in seminars/conferences organized by other institutions/organizations. Infrastructure is provided to them for carrying out research work in the College.
- Faculty development training programmes, such as on Research Methodology, statistical packages (SPSS, E-views), Capacity Building of Women, and Manager in Higher Education etc. is conducted by the affiliating University and teachers are invited to participate. Duty leaves are sanctioned to attend the programmes.
- Computer Skill Development Programme for teachers is organized by the College.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The College has a 'self-appraisal system' to evaluate the performance of the faculty and ensure that information on multiple activities, like post with salary details, teaching, research and extension programmes etc. is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal. The DHE of Government of Odisha receives Performance-Appraisal Report at the time of promotion from one post to another post and one grade pay to another grade pay. The Reports are evaluated secretly by the Principal and send to the DHE for approval. The College also appraises the performance of its non-teaching staff at the time of promotion recommended by the Principal and approval by the DHE.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The PAR submitted by the staffs are reviewed by authority and found to be satisfactory and intimated to the higher authority for future course of action. Promotion and new grade pay are considered as per report approved by the higher authority of DHE. Outcomes and decisions are communicated to the appropriate stakeholders through the Principal.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The College has several welfare schemes for its teaching and nonteaching staff. Many staff had been availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years (2009-10 to 2012-13):

Duty leave – Duty leave is given, if applicable. 38 percent of teachers availed duty leave for attending orientation programmes / refresher courses / seminars / conferences / training programmes / workshops / acting as resource person etc. Three (3) percent of non-teaching staff availed duty leave for attending staff development programmes.

Medical Leave –

1. Yearly 20 days half pay medical leaves are given to all the staff members. All teaching staff and all non-teaching staff had availed medical leave at least once within the last four years.
2. Six months maternity leave is provided to its female staff. One (1) female teacher availed maternity leave.
3. 15 days paternity leave is provided to the male staff. No one staff has been availed such leave.

Insurance –An insurance policy named Group Insurance is available to all the staff members of the college. The monthly premiums are automatically deducted from the salary as per Groups - A, B, C, D.

Medical Reimbursement (MR) – MR bill as per State Government rules is paid to the teaching staff and Group D non-teaching staff, who/family will go under medical treatment. 9 percent of teaching staff availed the benefit of such scheme. Medical allowance @ Rs.250 per month is paid to all Group-C non-teaching staff.

GPF – Provision of provident fund is available for all the staff members.

Loan – Provision of refundable/non-refundable advance from his/her GPF is available for their dependent person's welfare, like medical treatment, marriage, buying of computer for higher study, buying of family consumer goods, like T.V., Refrigerator etc. The loan amount is deducted from the employee's salary. 40 percent staff had taken the benefit of such loan.

Gratuity – Gratuity benefit is provided after retirement.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

As being a government college, is guided by the State Government Service Rules and hence all appointments and retention of faculty members are governed by the same. However, the government has taken lot of measures for attracting and retaining eminent faculty:

- Offers UGC pay scale.
- M.Phil and Ph.D. awarded teachers get additional increments as per UGC norms.
- Provides annual increments and promotion grants to the faculty as per UGC norms.
- Provides GPF.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The institutional mechanisms to monitor available financial resources are:

- Major policy decisions regarding financial planning are made by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Odisha.
- All financial accounts are audited.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Yes, the College has such mechanism. The external audit regarding all the government grants and non-government fund and expenditure of the College is conducted by the DHE through the Office of the Accountant General of Government of Odisha. Besides this, the internal audit regarding the minor/major research project fund sanctioned by various state/national agencies and all UGC funds sanctioned for the development of the College are audited by a private C.A.

There was no objection in the internal audit. The external audit was done on (04-07)/12/2013 for the financial year (2007-2012). They reported that there is no mis-utilization of finances in the college.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of receipts/funding of the College are:

- The component of staff salary is fully disbursed by the state government.
- Financial receipt on library books/journals is received from the state government and from the UGC fund.
- Student scholarships are received from various schemes under state and central governments.
- Annual charge @Rs.70/- from the students is collected at the time of admission.
- Different grants for updating/purchasing equipments/ teaching aids/ infrastructure for co-curricular development are received from the UGC.
- Grants for organizing seminars/workshops are received from UGC (NERO) /DST/TPCB/other state funding agencies.
- Funds for organizing extension and outreach programmes are received from the (i) State NSS Cell, Directorate of Youth Affairs & Sports for NSS activities, (ii) State and Central Govt. for NCC activities, (iii) State AIDS Control Society

There is no major deficit in the College fund so far.

7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

To make the campus eco-friendly, the college has taken many initiatives –

- i. **Energy conservation:-** *The students, teachers and employees of the college try their best to conserve energy. For this all are instructed to switch off the electrical appliances when they are not in use. The eco-club conducts awareness programmes on the conservation of energy.*
- ii. **Water Harvesting:-** *Water Harvesting system has been set up to meet the demand of storage of water. The water table is re-charged by constructing water pits near the bore wells.*
- iii. **Check-dam Construction:-** *The college is situated in a highly irrigated area of Western Odisha. Therefore there is no need of constructing check-dam.*
- iv. **Efforts for Carbon Neutrality:-** *A number of initiatives have been taken for Carbon neutrality—*
 - a. *Students are motivated and encouraged to use bicycle instead of motor bikes to assure a pollution free campus.*
 - b. *A number of trees are planted inside the campus for absorbing CO₂, dust and release of Oxygen.*
 - c. *Use of paper plates instead of plastic materials in canteen, departments & during feast.*
 - d. *The NSS & NCC units of College organize awareness programmes on global warming, Green environment, and acid rain.*
 - e. *The Botany department of the college takes the charge of maintaining botanical garden & medicinal plants.*

- v. **Plantation** – Plantation of various medicinal plants and other most useful plants in the campus one of the initiatives taken by NSS wing & eco-club.
- vi. **Hazardous waste Management**- Here also the NSS unit & eco-club perform vital role in the waste management. The hazardous waste such as plastic materials are collected and send to recycling units, and dangerous materials like broken glass pieces and waste chemicals are taken care of so as not to harm the environment.
- vii. **E-waste Management**- The outdated electronic appliances are sold as scraps to outside agencies as per Govt. directives.

7.2. Innovations:

A number of innovative practices have been initiated in the college during the last four years.

Innovations in students support system:

- ▶ Conversion of classrooms into interactive session.

The College conducts a number of Unit Tests to facilitate continuous evaluation and assessment of students' performance before sending them up for University Examinations.

Goal- The primary objectives of this practice is to bring about a total development of the personality of the students and prepare them as better citizens of the society and meet greater challenges in their lives. Keeping in mind the need of the hour, facilities for Women Empowerment are also undertaken.

3. The Context- In modern times it is observed that physical education is a neglected area, for which the educated youth of today has a truncated growth. Hence the need for physical training like Yoga to build up the all-round personality with proper emphasis on physical and spiritual dimensions of life are the need of the hour similarly women who are traditionally regarded as the weaker sex need to be trained up properly to participate equally and fearlessly in the Social Development. To cater to these needs, special courses in yoga and physical training for women are imparted in the college.

4. The Practice- A number of good practices has been introduced in the college for physical training and women empowerment. These are:

- The students are encouraged and to attend yoga and physical training classes regularly.
- Yoga camps are organized in the college & hostel premises at regular intervals under the supervision of a qualified yoga master of Bihar School of Yoga (Munger).
- The college is the Nodal Centre in the District of Bargarh to provide Self-Defence Training to women participants in the college.
- Women participants of the college are groomed as trainers to provide training in other colleges in the Districts.
- The N.S.S. Unit of the college organizes camps to create social awareness & spread socially relevant messages in the nearby areas.

5. Evidence of Success- The yoga and physical training helps the students to increase their skill and performance in the sporty activities which helps them to get entry into jobs in the police, military and Para-military services. Self- Defence Training for Women is a programme that has received wide appreciation from the public and alumni.

6. Problems encountered and Resources required- The College has a locational disadvantage which discourages greater participation of women in the self-defence training and lack of separate infrastructural support to provide a gender specific training in a co-educational environment. Vacancy in the position of a Physical Education Trainer (PET) for a long time in the college has its negative impact on the greater participation and improvement of the skills of students.

7. Note- The College motivates the students to have increased involvement and participation in the empowerment of women and all round development of student's programmes. The college has also plans to enroll maximum students in such courses in future.

PART-IV

Observation made in the First Assessment Report & Initiatives taken

Post – Accreditation Initiatives

Recommendation: 01

Panchayat College should try to introduce need-based and job-oriented courses suited to its socio-economic background. Students should have the opportunity of pursuing non-core courses on computer applications and spoken English. The college may also try to introduce courses related to agriculture, like soil testing and seed technology. A short programme on entrepreneurship may also be helpful to the graduating students.

Since our college is a government lead college, we have certain limitation in opening new courses of our own. The college has recently submitted a proposal to Department of Higher Education to open vocational courses in Handloom Technology, Agricultural technology, Textile Design, Blood Banking keeping in mind its demand and suitability of the socio-economic condition of the people at Bargarh. Bargarh district is the Rice bowl of the state with more than 80% irrigated land. Most of the people depend on agriculture for their livelihood. Apart from Agriculture, Sambalpuri Saree and fabrics produced here with a unique textile design is world famous. There are certain communities in the district who traditionally inherit the art of weaving from their fore fathers. This traditional knowledge are at the verge of extinction due to lack of proper support. The Central government has established a research institute “Indian Institute of Handloom Technology” at Bargarh to revive and promote handloom technology. We intend to utilize the available local traditional expertise and expertise at IIHT for the vocational courses which we are planning to begin. We have introduced a paper on entrepreneurship at B.Com and M.Com level to inculcate entrepreneurship quality in the students. As regards providing opportunity for spoken English, it is done in a limited scale at degree level and is syllabus based only. However, We are planning to widen the scope to all the students of the college irrespective of their subject and specialization. A well-furnished and equipped Language Laboratory is under construction under the direct supervision of the experts from the Centre for Advanced Communication, IIT, Kharagpur, West Bengal.

Recommendation: 02

The college may also try to introduce training for competitive examinations conducted by the Public Service Commissions on Self-financing basis.

We are providing training to the students for various competitive examinations through the “Entry into Service” programme initiated by UGC. Departments with post graduate programme also provide training to the students for UGC and UGC-CSIR NET. Beginning training to the students for competitive examination conducted by public service commission on self-financing basis though is a welcome suggestion, we have not yet established the training programme due to acute shortage of teaching faculty in the college.

Recommendation: 03

The college may take an effort to organize lectures on secularism, convergence of religious thought, human rights, evils of dowry system, eradication of superstitions, social equality and justice, environmental issues etc.

A special compulsory paper “Indian Society and Culture” has been introduced in the curriculum of all stream of the students at Bachelor degree level. The college has formed an environment

conscious group “Eco club” to promote and to make the students aware of various current environmental issues at local, state and national level. Special festival “Van Mahotsav” is celebrated with active participation of faculties and students that enhance the awareness among the students for the necessity of conservation of forest. Time to Time every department organizes lectures on various social issues and invites the local activists and social workers as speakers on various occasions.

Recommendation: 04

The college has several overhead projectors. It may encourage use of audio-visual teaching aids in classroom teaching.

Use of audio-visual aids in classroom teaching has become a regular practice in most of the department of the college. We have also purchased a number of LCD projector and interactive smart boards which teachers are using during classroom to make teaching more effective. Regular class seminars are also organized every Saturday which is managed by the student selected as seminar secretary and students prepare PowerPoint presentation on the topic of their interest. The college has developed a smart classroom with ICT facility which is used by departments having no ICT facility.

Recommendation: 05

The laboratories may be equipped with modern equipments so that the students get adequate exposure to their use. The Botany department may try to establish a museum.

A number of sophisticated equipments have been purchased from UGC funds. The list of major and minor equipments available in laboratories of various departments has been mentioned in 3.3.1. **Please refer page no. 42.**

A new laboratories complex has been constructed to address the scarcity of space for establishing museum in the department of Botany. A museum with herbarium and other modern facilities will be established for the use of student and faculties and locals.

Recommendation: 06

The academic departments may try to organize seminar lectures on regular basis by inviting academicians from the University and neighboring colleges, professional and social workers from NGOs of repute. The college may try to organize seminars and conferences directed towards faculty development. The college may arrange educational excursions, visits to museums and places of historical interest under the guidance of teachers.

Academic departments of the college frequently invite academicians from University and neighboring colleges, professional for special seminar lectures. However, the college is trying to organize a national conference directed towards faculty development. Department of zoology arranges educational/field trip to nearby Debrigarh sanctuary, Gandhamardan hill, sericulture industry, fishery hub, pearl culture etc. Chemistry department arranges Industrial tour to ACC Cement factory, Tora Sugar Mill etc. Department of Physics takes students for study tour to Institute of Physics and Planetarium located at Bhubaneswar. Despite the lack of funding for educational excursion, faculty members try their best to educate the students by exposing them to the best possible learning resources located nearby. One of our faculty member from Department of History Dr. N Seth is working on “Inscriptional Place names of Odisha from 736 to 1568 A.D” and has taken special interest in organizing study tour of the students to a Huma, a Historical Leaned Lord Shiva Temple located at the bank of River Mahanadi, Sambalpur and to the Chausathi Yogini Temple, a Historical temple located at Bolangir, Odisha.

Recommendation: 07

Teachers may try to obtain Minor Research Projects, either on their own or in collaboration with other departments. Research topics should preferably be relevant to local and present day needs.

During the last four years, a number of faculty members (two from English Department and one from History Department) have got minor research Projects funded by University Grant Commission. Many others have applied for various projects relevant to local needs to several funding Agency. Dr. Iswar Baitharu from Department of Zoology has applied for Young Scientist (Fast Track Project) to be funded by Department of Science and technology (DST), New Delhi. He also has submitted a project to Department of Science and Technology, Odisha in collaboration with Dr. Ekamber Kariali, Reader in Life Sciences, Sambalpur University, Odisha.

Recommendation: 08

The college may try to cooperate with Government Depts. And NGOs in extension work.

The college has taken special care and effort to increase co-operation with local health care professional in organizing blood donation through Youth Red Cross. A number of blood donation camps have been organized successfully as a joint venture with local health care professional since last four years. The Eco Club members co-ordinate with forestry officials and NGOs to create awareness among the local people for forest conservation by celebrating “Van Mohatsav”.

Recommendation: 09

The college Library is housed in an old building and its accommodation is not suited for good library management. The college may try to renovate the building for better functioning of the library.

The College Library has been renovated and reading room facility has been developed for the students and faculty members. Approx. 1000+ new books have been added to the library stock. A number of Science monthly journals are now subscribed and displayed for reference of students and faculties. The college is also trying to develop library automation facility for smooth operation and to improve the ease of access of books. Infilib net facility for e-resources are also available in the college.

Recommendation: 10

The college needs an auditorium with public address system. it may approach UGC and the local MP and MLAs for funding the project. It should also have sheds for cycles and two wheelers of students and staff.

The college has an open stage “Biju Pattanaik Rangamanch” at the center of the college campus for annual function and public functions. College has approached the local MLAs and MP for funding and got assurance for financial assistance for construction of an auditorium with public address system and seating facility for 300+ persons. College has already developed a conference and a smart room for meeting for official purposes. A new Shed has been constructed and the existing sheds for bicycle and two wheelers have been renovated for parking vehicles of students and staffs. A new Language lab facility has also been developed in the college for phonetics and other language related studies.

Recommendation: 11

There is scope for enhancing the greenery of the campus by utilizing the empty spaces. Plantation of more trees would be beneficial for the environment.

We have planned to make the college campus more green by developing plantation programmes once the construction of hostel buildings are over.

Recommendation: 12

The dining and kitchen may be renovated to ensure hygienic conditions. Students residing in the hostel also need better toilet facilities.

New Hostel buildings (three BOYS Hostel and One Girls Hostel) are under construction. Special care are being taken to facilitate the students with proper dining and kitchen facility, better toilet facility and better hygiene.

Recommendation: 13

Many girls students would be benefited if the college provides hostel accommodation for them. The college may seek UGC assistance for construction of Girls' hostel.

A girl's hostel with accommodation capacity of 100 girls is under construction after getting funding from UGC.

Recommendation: 14

The college may try to impart computer training to all teachers and provide access to Internet facility.

The teaching and non-teaching staffs are periodically trained with computer applications with the help of local computer training centers. Presently, all department and library have their own desktop/laptops with BSNL broadband net connectivity. The college is also planning to make it a Wi-Fi campus for the students and teachers very soon.

Recommendation: 15

The college has some facilities for sports and cultural activities. However, it may encourage students to participate in these activities in greater numbers. The college may try to introduce aerobics, and kho-kho to involve more students at low cost.

The college promotes the boys and girls for various sports and cultural activities. We have introduced kho-kho and aerobics to both boys' and girls'. Attempts are made to fill up the vacant post of physical education teacher. A boy's common room cum Indore game complex is under construction and it will be ready very shortly.

Recommendation: 16

The college should try to keep up-to-date record of its alumni and may invite the Alumni Association to take a more active part in the development of the college.

Every department maintains record of their alumni and updates it regularly. Attempts are also made to connect the old alumni to our record through social networking sites such as Facebook, LinkedIn etc. Alumni meet are held annually in every department. The participation of the alumni members to facilitate infrastructural development of the college is very appreciable and encouraging.

1. To expand infrastructure facilities.
2. To construct an auditorium.
3. To construct a gymnasium for health activities.
4. To construct an Eco-Park on the backyard of the college.
5. To get autonomous status.
6. To construct a computer lab of 30 sitters.
7. To introduce self financing course like IT & B.Ed.
8. To establish Academic & Professional linkage with industries.
9. To encourage the faculty to undertake more minor and major research projects.
10. To establish ICT enabled classrooms.
11. Propose to begin vocational courses in Healthcare & Nursing, Automobiles, and Printing Technology.

Action Taken by the College

- The College is trying its best to appraise the Govt. to fill up the vacant posts. But the posts are not yet filled up by regular appointment. However the college has managed to appoint 13 part time lecturers to meet the requirement of faculty. In-fact staff position is the weakest point of the college.
- Since last two years every department is conducting departmental seminars and the students are motivated by the teachers to present papers in the seminars. Many external experts are also invited to these seminars. One National Seminar was also conducted by the P.G. Department of Odia on the Literature of great Odia Poet **Swabhaba Kabi Gangadhar Meher**.
- Though there is no budget provision for activities like excursion, projects, etc; the department of Zoology, Botany, History and Odia have been organizing study tours for students regularly.
- Last year tree plantation programme was organized in the college involving the NCC and NSS students. The programme was organized in collaboration with the Department of Forest.
- College is organizing lectures on secularism, human right, evils of dowry system, social equality and justice by inviting eminent speakers, religious leaders and our own faculty members.
- Four new laboratories for the department of Physics, Chemistry, Botany & Zoology are under construction which will be completed shortly.
- The renovation work of the college library is under progress. Two new halls will be constructed adjacent to the old building.
- A Girls' Hostel (UGC funded) with intake capacity of 100 is under construction.
- Three more Boys' Hostels are also under construction.
- Eight Departments have been provided with internet facility and the teachers and students are utilizing the service for teaching and learning purpose. The college has also a computer lab with internet facility which is utilized by faculties.

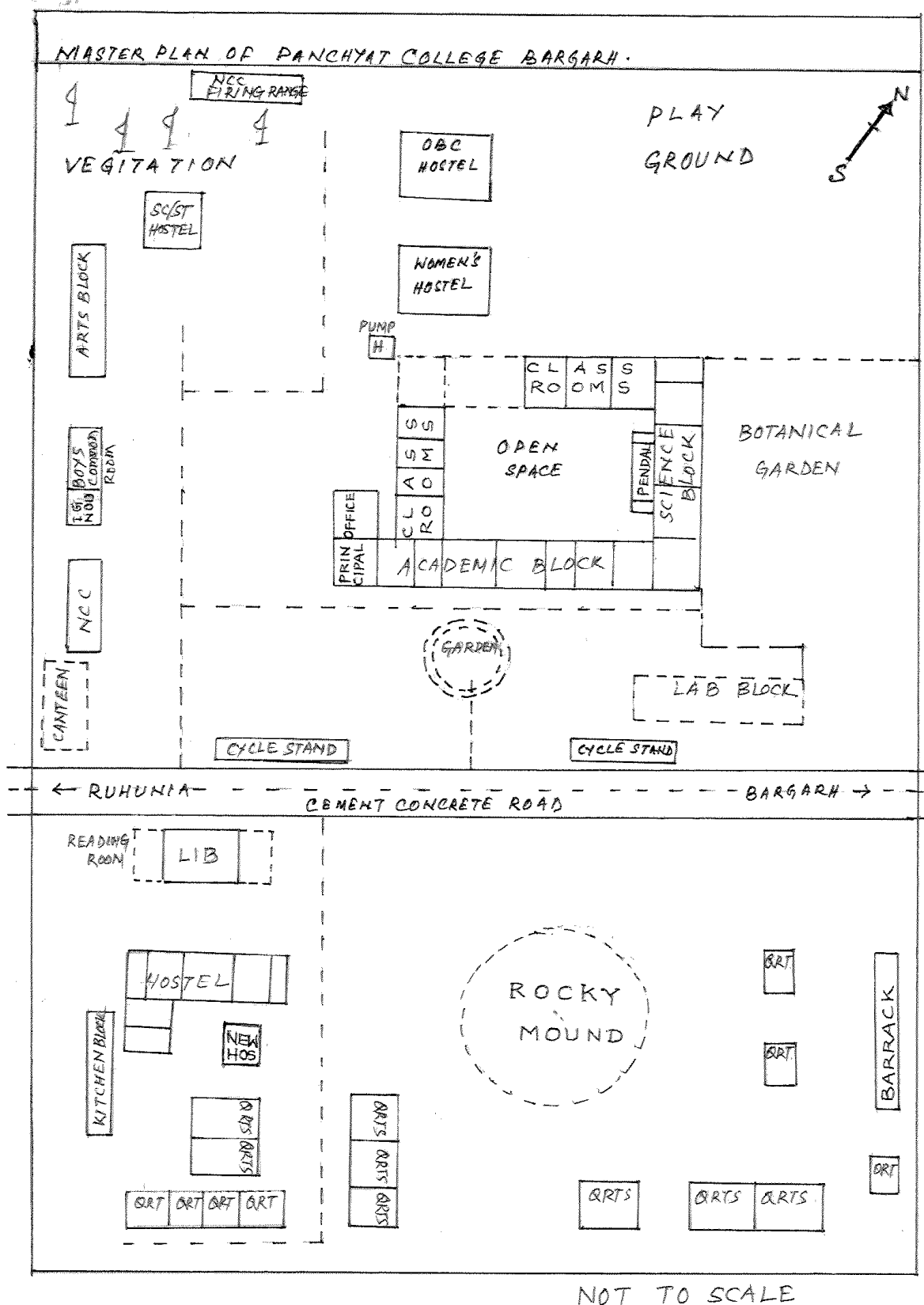
