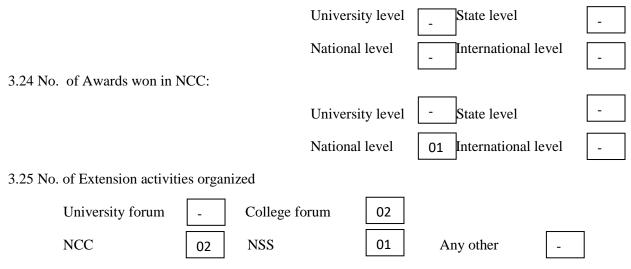

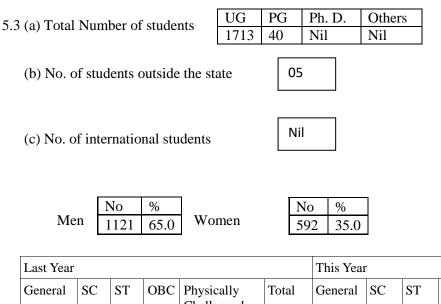

ANNEXURE: I

BEST PRACTICE-I

1. Title of the practice

Development of Communication Skills in English.

2. Objectives of the practice

The objectives of the practice is to enhance ability of the students to develop communication skills in English.

3. The context

Since long it has been observed that students passing out from our colleges and universities even with high percentage of marks are lacking in communication skills in English, which make them less employable. Further, English syllabuses in the higher secondary and graduation levels are mostly traditional, which do not cater to the need of our students, especially for developing their listening and speaking competence. In the circumstances, the Govt. of Odisha has launched a "Short Term Course in Communication Skills in English", for the students of degree classes. The course is fully sponsored by the Govt. and therefore free of cost.

4. The practice

A number of good practices are adopted by the college to maintain the stakeholders' relationship. These are:

- Communication Skill Classes are organised for the students after their regular classes are over and also on Sundays.
- Applications are invited from students for enrolment.
- Students are divided into groups of 24.
- Faculty members of English Department & some invited Guest faculties take classes in the Language Lab.
- ICT is used to develop communication skills.
- Students are encouraged to participate in group discussion.
- Individual guidance is provided to weak participants.
- Presentation skills & skill of facing the Interviews are taught.

5. Evidence of Success

Students after attending communications skill development classes are showing more interest in participation in Seminar & Group Discussion.

6. Problems encountered and resources required

• The Programme has been started with the financial support of State Govt. Once the financial grant stopped, the college has to generate its own fund to run the programme.

7. Challenges

- Inculcating communication skills among all the passing out students of the college.
- Starting a Certificate course in communication skills on self financing basis.
- Motivating students to develop habit of using English in all types of communication.
- Developing the analytical ability of students in English.
- Raising fund to develop another laboratory with seating capacity of 60 to cater to the need of large numbers of stake-holders.

ANNEXURE: II

BEST PRACTICE-II

1. Title of the Practice: Empowerment of women and all round development of studies.

2. Goal:

The primary objectives of this practice is to bring about a total development of the personality of the students and prepare them as better citizens of the society and meet greater challenges in their lives. Keeping in mind the need of the hour, facilities for Women Empowerment are also undertaken.

3. The Context:

In modern times it is observed that physical education is a neglected area, for which the educated youth of today has a truncated growth. Hence the need for physical training like Yoga to build up the all round personality with proper emphasis on physical and spiritual dimensions of life are the need of the hour similarly women who are traditionally regarded as the weaker sex need to be trained up properly to participate equally and fearlessly in the Social Development. To cater to these needs, special courses in yoga and physical training for women, are imparted in the college.

4. The Practice:

A number of good practices have been introduced in the college for physical training and women empowerment. These are:

- The students are encouraged and to attend yoga and physical training classes regularly.
- Yoga camps are organized in the college & hostel premises at regular intervals under the supervision of a qualified yoga master of Bihar School of Yoga (Munger).
- The college is the Nodal Centre in the District of Bargarh to provide Self-Defence Training to women participants in the college.
- Women participants of the college are groomed as trainers to provide training in other colleges in the Districts.
- The N.S.S. Unit of the college organizes camps to create social awareness & spread socially relevant messages in the nearby areas.

5. Evidence of Success:

The yoga and physical training helps the students to increase their skill and performance in the sporty activities which helps them to get entry into jobs in the police, military and Para-military services. Self- Defence Training for Women is a programme that has received wide appreciation from the public and alumni.

6. Problems encountered and Resources required:

The college has a locational disadvantage which discourages greater participation of women in the self-defence training and lack of separate infrastructural support to provide a gender specific training in a co-educational environment. Vacancy in the position of a Physical Education Trainer (PET) for a long time in the college has its negative impact on the greater participation and improvement of the skills of students.

7. Note:

The college motivates the students to have increased involvement and participation in the empowerment of women and all round development of students programmes. The college has also plans to enrol maximum students in such courses in future.
